The Entrepreneurial Imperative: Why Libraries Are Critical to Local Economies in the 21st Century

Michael Sherrod, as the Texas Christian University (TCU) William M. Dickey Entrepreneur in Residence, teaches undergraduates and manages an interdisciplinary, faculty based entrepreneurship program. He has been a pioneer in the online world since 1985. Mr. Sherrod has founded/co-founded 10 companies, including Black Dove Media, LLC and DigitalCity.com, and has served in senior management roles at AMR Information Services, AOL, Ancestry.com and Examiner.com. He recently served as the first Publisher of TexasTribune.org, is Immediate Past Chair of the Board of Umbel.com and sits on the Kinsey Institute Board of Trustees.

Mr. Sherrod will also be giving an individual presentation, entitled, “How librarians and library resources can help entrepreneurs and small business owners.” Mr. Sherrod’s keynote will be “The Entrepreneurial Imperative: Why Libraries are Critical to Local Economies in the 21st Century.” This talk focuses on why all of us, corporations, nonprofits, government entities, and individuals are subject to the “Entrepreneurial Imperative”.

What is the “Entrepreneurial Imperative”? It is simply the fact that in every economic entity in America will be forced by economic reality to be, to a greater or lesser degree, entrepreneurial. Libraries must play a central role in preparing their patrons and their communities for this paradigm shifting change in the way value is created, jobs produced, and economies stabilized.
